Between the spectacular scenic overlooks, the waters, and the local folks you'll meet along the way, this is the haven that calls you back year after year. We hope you'll embrace every opportunity to immerse yourself in this place called Mountaineer Country!

OUTDOORS

MOUNTAIN BIKING

Whether you prefer trails made of concrete or dirt, miles of track are open for adventure in Mountaineer Country.

There are routes for every skill level, from flat rail trails where the whole family can pedal together to heart-pounding technical courses climbing up through thickly forested mountains and back down again.

Each trail is ready to delight the most experienced mountain bikers.

Bike rentals in downtown Morgantown have easy access to the Mon River Rail-Trail. If you brought your own wheels with you and need a tune-up or repair, count on local businesses to keep you moving. Once your ride is ready to go, choose the route that's right for you.



COOPERS ROCK STATE FOREST

Roughly 50 miles of bike trails wind through Coopers Rock State Forest, just 15 minutes from downtown Morgantown. If you're an experienced mountain biker up for a challenge, take the Raven Rock Trail and climb to the top of the forest for an epic view of the Cheat River Canyon. Forty registered and 10 single-track trails will keep you exploring for hours.

BIG BEAR LAKE TRAIL CENTER

For an affordable day pass, you can enjoy more than 50 miles of expertly groomed trails within this privately-owned Bruceton Mills trail park. At Big Bear Lake Trail Center, you'll find routes the whole family will enjoy, gradual climbs, challenging rocky paths, and a white-knuckle downhill route or two for more experienced riders. Plus, visit our events calendar at vistmountaineercountry.com/events for your favorite biking events, such as Bike Bash WV in July.

VALLEY FALLS STATE PARK

Mountain bikers will enjoy the 18 miles of scenic trails that cut through Valley Falls State Park—located south of Morgantown near Fairmont. Bike routes also traverse the stone remains of the grist and lumber mills that supported a small community that existed here along the banks of the Tygart River.

WHITE PARK

Managed by the Board of Parks and Recreation, White Park is a green space in Morgantown that has become an urban playground for mountain bike enthusiasts. There's a 3.5-mile trail fitting for intermediate riders, 3-4 miles of hard-pack trails perfect for beginners, and single-track routes meandering through the park.





MON RIVER RAIL-TRAIL SYSTEM

You'll discover epic river views, waterfalls, and historical sites near the Mon River Rail-Trail stretching over 47 miles along the mighty Monongahela River through Marion and Monongalia counties. The trail is paved in some areas and crushed stone in others, and the entire length is well-suited for riders of all levels. You'll find the trailhead just north of Morgantown in Point Marion, Pa., and its terminus at Prickett's Fort State Park near Fairmont. The Mon River Rail-Trail is recognized by the National Rails-to-Trails Hall of Fame.

OUTDOORS

WHITEWATER RAFTING AND KAYAKING

West Virginia is a year-round whitewater destination for paddlers from all over the world. The Cheat Canyon section of the Cheat River is North Central West Virginia's premier springtime Class V whitewater run. Located in Albright, the canyon boasts 13 miles of unsurpassed wilderness. Enjoy fully guided whitewater rafting, kayaking, canoeing, tubing, swimming, rock jumping, rock climbing, paintball, and riverside picnicking for a perfect summer day on the river.

Rafting and kayaking tours and rentals are available through local guiding companies Cheat River Outfitters and Blackwater Outdoor Adventures, located about an hour and 20 minutes from Morgantown in Parsons, WV.



CHEAT NARROWS

You'll find the Cheat Narrows section of the Cheat River near the community of Kingwood. The run is best for beginner to intermediate paddlers with rapids ranging from class II-III, depending on the time of year. The Narrows is one of the cleanest and most beautiful runs around. Summer tends to have the slowest water when river levels are typically at their lowest point. There are multiple areas to enter the river along Route 72.

CHEAT CANYON

The Cheat Canyon offers 13 miles of adrenaline-pumping rapid fun from Albright to the Jenkinsville Bridge. The route isn't for the faint of heart, with rapids from class III-V along the way. Rafting in the canyon happens mainly in the spring, but trips are possible in the summer and fall, depending on water levels.

VALLEY FALLS STATE PARK

Valley Falls State Park gets its name from the four cascading waterfalls that follow along the natural bend of the Tygart River. Kayakers and paddlers are invited to test the waters; fast currents and rocky falls make each section of the Valley Falls to Hammond kayaking route challenging. Rated a class II-IV in difficulty, this 3.4-mile route features three drops: the Valley Falls (class rating IV), the Hamburger Helper (class rating IV+), and the Twist and Shout Takeout.



BULL RUN

This waterway is a favorite of local kayakers and is best suited for paddlers with extensive river experience. The 3-mile route with class V+rapids ends at the entrance to the Cheat River.

DECKERS CREEK

The most experienced paddlers with little fear will cherish the ride on Deckers. The route is steep and full of undercuts and sieves that can quickly flash fill. If you think you'd like to paddle Deckers Creek—ideal for its proximity to Morgantown—go with someone who knows the route well.

LAUREL RUN

This advanced paddler route runs roughly 5 miles from Morgantown to the Big Sandy Creek confluence near Bruceton Mills. On the run, you'll encounter class V+ rapids and enjoy spectacular, pristine wilderness.

OUTDOORS

FISHING

West Virginia has an infinite number of rivers, lakes, streams, creeks, and ponds where aquatic life thrives. Reeling in a prized catch like the one-of-a-kind golden trout is possible any time you wet a line. The state has become an angler's dream destination with so much opportunity in a stunning setting.

More than 150 species of fish will taunt you as long as you let them. Bluegill, channel catfish, largemouth bass, muskie, northern pike, smallmouth bass, spotted bass, sunfish, trout, and walleye are a few of the most common species you might hook in the area. Many of the ponds in the region are even stocked annually by the state.

Remember that fishermen and women older than 15 must hold a valid fishing license to cast in West Virginia waters. You can purchase your license online or get one in person from participating retail merchants.





CHEAT LAKE

This popular recreational lake sees plenty of traffic from early spring through late fall. You can fish from your boat—put in at the free Sunset Beach Public Launch or pay to launch from the Cheat Lake Marina. You can also fish from your kayak—put in at the fishing area and kayak launch near the Cheat Lake Bridge or from Cheat Lake Park. Keep your eyes peeled for bass, catfish, walleye, and pike.

MONONGAHELA RIVER

Cast a line for channel catfish and smallmouth bass on the 128-mile mighty Monongahela River. Fish from the shore or launch your boat from one of four public boat ramps in Fort Martin, Star City, Granville, and Morgantown—which is handicap accessible at the Walnut Street Landing. You can also lock through the Mon on your kayak for greater access to the river north or south of Morgantown.

CHEAT RIVER

Free-flowing water, breathtaking swimming holes, and incredible wilderness entice visitors to **Cheat River**. There's boat access along this river that is an excellent waterway for angler fishing. Expect to see channel catfish, smallmouth bass, and spotted bass in the pristine waters.



TYGART VALLEY RIVER

The Tygart Valley River is stocked annually by the state in February, every other week from March to May, and twice more each October. That means it's a great fishing destination with a high probability of catching bass and trout.

TYGART LAKE

This 1,750-acre body of water is the crown jewel of Tygart Lake State Park and is stocked monthly from February to May and twice in October. You can fish from the shore in designated areas throughout the park and launch your boat from the Tygart Lake Marina. Boat rentals are available from the marina, too.



BIG BEAR LAKE

A favorite outdoor recreation destination for Mountaineer Country families since 1972 is the privately-owned Big Bear Lake Family Campland. Boats are allowed, and no fishing license is required on the 35-acre lake. Access is only available for property owners or those staying in the resort. Day-use passes are available.

DIXON LAKE AND MASON LAKE

Both Dixon and Mason lakes are stocked by the state and full of bass, channel catfish, muskie, and trout. The lakes are part of the Pedlar Wildlife Management Area accessible from West Virginia Rt. 7, also known as the Mason-Dixon Highway.

OUTDOORS

ZIPLINE CANOPY TOUR

As you're heading northeast on I-79 from Morgantown, you'll quickly see signs to Coopers Rock State Forest. Exit 15 delivers you to the WVU Zipline Canopy Tour, where you'll find four zip lines leading to seven platforms and aerial bridges that you'll traverse on your tour. You'll be 980 feet above sea level at its highest point in the canopy until your final rappel to the course-terminating platform.

The tour takes around three hours to complete and is available to visitors in the spring, summer, and fall. It's the perfect activity for families traveling together, groups, or solo travelers with a taste for adventure. You can even spend the night in the forest in one of the campsites, yurt bunkhouses, or cabins. Learn more about the zipline tour and other Adventure WV Outdoor Classroom activities, like the state-of-the-art challenge course, and make reservations online at adventurechallenge.wvu.edu.

ROCK CLIMBING/ BOULDERING

Experienced rock climbers know where to go for the best routes on the East Coast: Almost Heaven, West Virginia. This is home to world-class climbing, and Mountaineer Country offers everything from technical pitches to bouldering. You'll find easy ascents where new climbers can practice more advanced routes and multi-pitch climbs. The scenery around you is worth almost as much as the climb, with canyon overlooks, mountain lakes, and thick, emerald-colored Appalachian forest around every bend.

Mountaineer Country has a robust climbing community if you're searching for like-minded enthusiasts to show you the way. Head to a premier destination like Coopers Rock State Forest or Snake Hill Wildlife Management Area—offering some of the best bouldering terrains—to experience a true climbing paradise less than 20 minutes outside of Morgantown.





COOPERS ROCK STATE FOREST

One of the best places to start your climbing adventure in Mountaineer Country is on the sandstone cliffs within Coopers Rock State Forest. More than 100 established boulder problems, short trad leads, and top-rope climbs provide ample challenges.

SNAKE HILL WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA

Avoid the crowds and head to **Snake Hill Wildlife**Management Area near the **Cheat Lake area** of

Monongalia County. You'll find trad routes and

what some consider the best-established boulder

problems in the area.

THE BRIDGE INDOOR CLIMBING WALL

The Bridge Sports Complex houses an impressive—and colorful—indoor climbing area featuring 31 unique walls. The space simulates an outdoor climbing experience for the whole family and everyone enjoying it must complete a pre-climb safety briefing.

The clip 'n climb challenges are housed inside a 155,000 s.f. indoor recreation facility, which includes six basketball/volleyball courts, two pools (competition and warm-up), a fitness center with group training rooms, an elevated running track, and a café.

OUTDOORS

HIKING AND SCENIC NATURE

West Virginia is considered one of the best states for hiking. Almost Heaven catalogs more than 450 identified trails traversing the state with varying terrain and something for hikers of all skill levels.

The seven-county region boasts hundreds of miles of developed trails weaving through areas of unsurpassed beauty.

Multiple parks and forests include Cathedral State Park and Coopers Rock State Forest in Preston County, Valley Falls State Park in Marion County, Watters Smith State Park in Harrison County, and Tygart Lake State Park in Taylor County. And there's still more to explore on the miles of trails at the WVU Arboretum and West Virginia Botanic Gardens in Morgantown.

CRANESVILLE SWAMP

This Nature Conservancy-protected land is a special place and one of the state's most unique ecosystems, unlike anything in the immediate vicinity. You'll encounter a few miles of developed trails within the Cranesville Swamp, meandering through the unique arboreal bog habitat that's always a few degrees cooler than the surrounding area.

WV BOTANIC GARDEN

The WV Botanic Garden is another special place to log a few miles on woodland trails. The **85-acre public garden** is maintained by volunteers and open to the public all year. You'll find a wide variety of native plant species, wetlands, meadows, and a virgin hemlock grove.

CORE ARBORETUM


Visit the 91-acre Core Arboretum in the center of Morgantown. Explore three miles of hiking trails through the old-growth forest and botanical garden containing more than 150 native species. The arboretum is free and open to the public daily, closing at dusk.

CATHEDRAL STATE PARK

There are very few tracts of old-growth virgin forest left in West Virginia, but you can explore one of them in Cathedral State Park. Several miles of trails include the popular Giant Hemlock Trail Loop, where hikers can take in the majesty of some of the park's largest trees.

COOPERS ROCK STATE FOREST

Visitors are treated to 50 miles of hiking trails within Coopers Rock State Forest in Preston County. Popular routes include the Overlook Trail, which delivers hikers to an epic vista over the glorious Cheat River Canyon; the Henry Clay Iron Furnace Trail, which features an iron furnace dating back to the 1800s; the Virgin Hemlock Trail, which leads hikers through canopies of lush hemlock trees; and the Raven Rock Trail, which opens to a spectacular view of the Cheat River Gorge.



MASON DIXON PARK

Mason Dixon Park is situated on the border of Pennsylvania and West Virginia. A 20-minute drive north delivers you to a quaint park with six hiking trails on 300 acres. One of the most popular routes is the Fairy Door Trail, complete with several tiny fairy houses constructed by local artists.

TYGART LAKE STATE PARK

This mountain lake is a stunning shade of blue and is **recreation heaven**, especially in the summer when you can take a cool dip after a long hike. Tygart Lake State Park has five established trails ranging from half a mile to two miles.

OUTDOORS

LODGING

Mountaineer Country caters to all travelers, offering hotels perfect for short stays and long-term business trips. TYGART LAKE STATE PARK LODGE, CAMPING, AND CABINS

Booking space in one of West Virginia's state parks is an affordable option offering incredible views no matter which park you choose. Consider the cerulean blue waters of Tygart Lake for your vacation, and choose from a stay in the lodge, reserve one of the campsites in the park, or book one of the park's 11 cabins available year-round.

COOPERS ROCK STATE FOREST CABINS AND CAMPGROUNDS

There are 50 campsites from which to choose within Coopers Rock State Forest, situated in two campgrounds: McCollum and Rhododendron, and open to campers from April to October. Or consider booking a Tentrr campsite where you'll find a preset canvas tent pitched on a wooden deck surrounded by majestic forest.

ALPINE LAKE RESORT

This lake community is situated on 2,000 acres east of Morgantown near Terra Alta in Preston County. There are vacation rentals available in the resort at various price points. During your stay, you can take advantage of the resort's amenities, including lodge activities, golf, and recreation on the 150-acre lake.





BIG BEAR LAKE CAMPLANDS

A stone's throw from Morgantown, you'll find a recreation area beloved by Mountaineer Country families for more than 50 years. CHEAT RIVER FESTIVAL

Held annually in May, this is the largest fundraiser for Friends of the Cheat, the conservation organization that has made great strides in improving and protecting the river. The festival lasts three days and features crafts, live music, and a down-river race.

DIRTY DOUBLE GRAVEL GRINDER

This two-day bike race is held each June in the Rowlesburg Community Park and invites participants to traverse 72 miles of dirt, gravel, and tar and chip roads with a steep downhill or two. Registration for the race opens in January, and tent and RV camping are available in the park.

RAGNAR TRAIL APPALACHIAN OVERNIGHT RUNNING RELAY

This race is like few others, and the fact that it's held in such a scenic location each August—Big Bear Lake Camplands—is a bonus. The race pits teams of eight against one another in an overnight relay race with plenty of built-in fun.

COOPERS ROCK 50K

Runners are challenged by the rugged terrain and scenic course of the Coopers Rock 50k, held in April each year. The course traverses almost every maintained trail in the state forest, and runners ascend more than 5,000 feet in elevation along the route.





Appalachian roots run deep in

Mountaineer Country. Not only is the
mountaineer West Virginia University's mascot, but it's
also an important symbol to the state and the people
that call these mountains home. The mountaineer
is a link to a time when the terrain was an untamed
wilderness. A time when frontiersmen in coon-skin
hats explored the rugged lands west of the Appalachian
Mountains in search of food, furs, and a future.

The region became an ethnic melting pot from the 1880s to the 1920s when coal mines attracted immigrants from Europe. Slovak, Polish, Hungarian, and Italian roots are common in the region, and their heritage has become an indistinguishable part of Mountaineer Country's tapestry. Countless customs and traditions passed down over generations are a vibrant part of daily life here and make Mountaineer Country an epicenter of culture.

CULTURE

HISTORY

Mountaineer Country offers tremendous opportunities to immerse yourself into history that stretches as far back as the Revolutionary War. Not far from these parts, you can walk in the footsteps of the great George Washington, visit pre-revolutionary forts, and stand in the middle of significant Civil War battlefields. When the Western half of Virginia seceded during the Civil War, West Virginia's road to statehood was initiated, making it the only state to form by splitting from another state.


From the nation's first homestead community following the devastating years of The Great Depression to important military sites highlighting soldiers who fought in every battle this country has faced, history lives on here. It colors a rich past that's as resilient as her people.



As part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal legislation in the early 1930s, resettlement communities popped up around the country. The first was Arthurdale here in Mountaineer Country, built in the hills of Preston County. First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt nurtured the community and often visited, earning Arthurdale the nickname "Eleanor's Little Village." Today, you will find 160 homesteads, a sampling of community buildings, and a museum preserved and celebrated as a National Historic District.

LADY OF THE PINES CHURCH

If your bucket list includes visiting the smallest church in the Lower 48, plan to visit Lady of the Pines in Parsons. There is room for just 12 faithful in the tiny church's six pews. The entire building measures only 24 feet by 12 feet. Sign the guest book before leaving and go to the Silver Lake Post Office next door, the world's smallest.

BATTLE OF ROWLESBURG ON CANNON HILL

Cannon Hill was a strategic site during the Civil War, used to protect the main supply line of the B&O Railroad. Self-guided tours are available, and guided tours can be arranged in advance.

PRICKETT'S FORT STATE PARK


History buffs are in for a treat with a visit to Prickett's Fort State Park in Marion County. Relive the pioneering spirit in the 18th-century re-creation of the original Prickett's Fort, which provided a place of refuge from Indigenous American attacks. Tours feature costumed interpreters demonstrating various colonial skills and conveying the fort's fascinating history. The day-use park is just north of Fairmont.

GRAFTON NATIONAL CEMETERY

The Grafton National Cemetery encompasses 3.5 acres in Taylor County and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It first opened in 1868 and contains the remains of more than 2,000 soldiers. Soldiers from every war—from the Civil War to Vietnam—are buried there.

GREATEST GENERATION WWII MUSEUM

The Greatest Generation WWII Museum in Rowlesburg contains allied and axis artifacts and exhibits from the war. It's open to visitors on weekends from May to October.








Festivals focused on history are the gemstones of Mountaineer Country. If you're in town over Memorial Day, a visit to Prickett's Fort State Park is a local favorite. The New Deal Festival in Arthurdale is held in July, and stop in for the Rowlesburg Ox Roast on Memorial Day.





THE MAST OF THE USS WEST VIRGINIA

Visit a piece of WWII history in the heart of the WVU campus in front of Oglebay Hall near the Mountainlair. The USS West Virginia was bombed and sunk at Pearl Harbor in the early morning of December 7, 1941. A student effort in 1961 brought the recovered ship's mast to Memorial Plaza on campus.

CULTURE

ART BEAT

Mountaineer Country is an art lover's paradise, and at the heart of the region's creativity are the artists, performers, and creators that live and work here.

With more than a dozen galleries to explore, you'll be astonished by the area's array of art, including traditional and contemporary painting, photography, pottery, sculpture, and textiles. Mountaineer Country's Appalachian roots are reflected in many galleries, but cultures from around the world are well-represented.

Community theater groups offer fans a never-ending showcase of dramatic plays, musicals, comedic performanceseven children's dance and theater.



ART MUSEUM OF WVU

Browse the collection of more than 4,000 works in paint, in print, on paper, and carved in clay at the Art Museum of WVU located on Fine Arts Drive on WVU's Evansdale Campus. The museum is committed to bringing the world's great artistic traditions to Mountaineer Country while showcasing the talents and practices of artists who have called West Virginia home.

THE MESAROS GALLERIES CAC

The Mesaros Galleries, also on the WVU campus, house special collections and exhibits by Master of Fine Arts Students attending the University. The galleries are in the Douglas O. Blaney Lobby of the WVU Canady Creative Arts Center and are worth a visit while you're in town.

RUBY AMPHITHEATER AT THE HAZEL RUBY MCQUAIN PARK

Rising stars performing at the Ruby Amphitheater are rivaled by—the stars! The outdoor venue is ideally situated on the riverfront and hosts popular summer concert series and family-friendly celebrations.

METROPOLITAN THEATRE

The Metropolitan Theatre was dubbed "West Virginia's most beautiful playhouse" when it opened to the public in 1924. The building was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1984, is still beloved by the community, and continues to host live performances all year.

MONONGALIA ARTS CENTER

The nonprofit, community-driven Monongalia Arts Center is located in a beautifully restored post office built in 1913 and designed in the Beaux-Arts classical style. There are two galleries within the center and a small historic theater. Events, art workshops, and classes are offered throughout the year.

WVU CANADY CREATIVE ARTS CENTER

Big name acts often perform on the WVU Canady Creative Arts Center stage, and the space is also the home of the West Virginia Public Theatre. The center is located on the University's Evansdale campus, a stone's throw from the WVU Art Museum.


PUBLIC ART AND FESTIVALS

COVERED BRIDGES


Covered bridges are an endearing part of the state's history, and there are a few in Mountaineer Country that shouldn't be missed. The oldest, and longest bridge in West Virginia, at 285 feet, is the Philippi Covered Bridge in Barbour County. The second-longest is Carrollton Covered Bridge in Volga, just a few miles away. Also, check out the Simpson Covered Bridge in Bridgeport, the Barrackville Covered Bridge in Marion County, and the Dents Run Covered Bridge outside Morgantown.

CHARGING STATIONS

Electric vehicle drivers can breathe easily while exploring the area, knowing that there are dozens of regional public and high-powered charging stations. All West Virginia State Parks have been outfitted with them, too.

ONE OF A KIND

Much of Mountaineer Country's history centers around small, rural communities, so it's no surprise there are so many one-of-a-kinds in the area. Make plans to seek out the cool, the unique, and the true bucket list-worthy sites unlike any other.



JFK MEMORIAL

President John F. Kennedy left his mark on Mountaineer Country when he announced his intent to enter the 1960 West Virginia primary while visiting Star City. The impressive memorial honoring his memory is 27 feet wide, consisting of three tall granite pillars with bronze statues of JFK and a solitary statue of John Jr. saluting his father. The memorial is near the Rail-Trail riverfront in Star City.

DON KNOTTS STATUE

The famous actor Don Knotts was born and raised in Morgantown, graduating from one of the local high schools and then West Virginia University in 1948. He died in 2006, and 10 years later, the Morgantown community unveiled a statue in his honor on High Street in front of the Metropolitan Theatre. It's become a must-see for locals and visitors alike and a great spot for a selfie.

JERRY WEST AND HOT ROD HUNDLEY STATUES

Jerry West and Hot Rod Hundley were products of the West Virginia University basketball program. Both men landed in the NBA after college and are honored in Morgantown with bronze statues completed by local artist Jamie Lester. The life-size statues stand outside the WVU Coliseum on Monongahela Boulevard.

HOMEMADE

Call it ingenuity, creativity, or luck, but folks in Mountaineer Country and West Virginia have produced one-of-a-kind products; we recommend bringing an extra suitcase for souvenirs and gifts.

The pepperoni roll is West Virginia's official state food, and Country Club Bakery in Fairmont is widely regarded as the birthplace of this iconic West Virginia food.

Grab a bottle of Heasley Homestead Maple Syrup and a sack of buckwheat flour, and you'll have the makings of a proper Preston County breakfast when you get home.

Moonshine has a long tradition in the Appalachians. There are a few legal moonshine producers in the region, including MannCave Distillery in Weston and Forks of Cheat Distillery in Morgantown-where they also use the product to "fortify" their port wine! They are a family-owned and operated vineyard offering tastings and tours seven days a week.



You won't find another pair of shoes quite like Gurkee's Rope Sandals, founded in Morgantown in 1984, or experience handmade bath and beauty products of higher quality than those from TigerFly Soap Co. in Terra Alta.

You can also outfit your kitchen with the 170 different hardwood kitchen utensils fashioned by the folks at Allegany Treenware in Thornton.




BLACK BEAR BURRITOS

GAME-DAY FAVORITES

That Mountaineer Country is named after the region's favorite mascot should indicate how passionate fans get on game day. WVU tailgates are legendary, and there are lots of lots surrounding the Milan Puskar Stadium—home of WVU Mountaineer Football. Chances are you'll meet new friends who will share great food with you. If you decide to catch the game on a big screen, a list of can't-miss local hangouts—some that have lasted more than 40 years in Mountaineer Country—is included below. Each one is worth the visit for an authentic taste of game day in Morgantown—and most are within reasonable walking distance from the stadium.

MARIO'S FISHBOWL

This WVU alumni favorite and local watering hole has more than 60 years of "reflections" written on receipts, napkins, and business cards that layer the walls; stop by and add yours. Pouring fishbowls to Mountaineer fans for years, this game-day favorite destination is known for "the coldest beer in Morgantown." Check out their two dine-in locations, or order takeout from the third.

CROCKETT'S LODGE

The go-to for football season where "table surfing" started in Morgantown! Since 1983, Crockett's has satisfied the hunger and thirst of many a Mountaineer before and after the games.

GENE'S BEER GARDEN

This neighborhood bar tucked into the Greenmont area near downtown has the honor and distinction of being the "oldest, still operating bar in Morgantown." Since 1944, Gene's has earned a solid reputation for cold beer, hot dogs, live music, and even livelier conversation.

WINGS OLE

Where "fries and bleu" and burritos have been an obsession for WVU students since 1977, but it's the wings by the bucket that keep them coming back. The homemade sauce is one-of-a-kind; no one wastes a napkin!

VARSITY CLUB

Arguably the closest place to get a cold beer outside of WVU's Milan Puskar Stadium, the Varsity Club is across from the stadium's south entrance and is alumni-owned and operated. You'll appreciate the walls covered in WVU sports memorabilia and the excellent service. The place is fairly small, so get there early.

KEGLER'S SPORTS BAR

Kegler's Sports Bar is another sports-loving, wing-eating institution in Morgantown. It's within walking distance of the stadium and is usually packed with Mountaineer fans on game day. Plenty of seating makes it a great choice if you're getting to town closer to kickoff.

NIGHTLIFE

Listen closely on any evening in Mountaineer Country, and you'll hear the sound of people having fun! Looking for live music, an outdoor patio to grab a drink with friends, or an upscale cocktail bar? In the mood for a laid-back vibe, country music, or open mic? The choices are endless! Mountaineer Country keeps the party going from day to night.

123 PLEASANT STREET

The original home of live music in Morgantown is, without a doubt, downtown at 123 Pleasant Street. It's been the hot spot for local and national acts since it opened in 1998. Check the calendar to find out who's on stage when you're in town.

BARTINI PRIMF

Bartini Prime is best known for sushi, dryaged beef, and Maryland crab cakes—no filler, just crab. The high-end indoor dining extends to a patio bar and several private rooms for large groups and gatherings. It's a short walk from the stadium to celebrate a Mountaineer Football win.

TROPICS RESTAURANT AND BAR

This Hawaiian-themed restaurant is a favorite for its taste of paradise, and creative, live entertainment performances are listed well in advance. Happy hour is always celebrated inside and on the restaurant's extensive outdoor patio. The signature cocktails are "aloha" in liquid form, and their Sunday brunch is a must. "Okole Maluna"—bottoms up!

LIVINGALOCAL

BREWERIES AND BEER PUBS

The surge in craft breweries over the past 20 years has put Mountaineer Country on the map for microbrew lovers. Local craft breweries are concocting exciting ales; all you need is a glass to experience one-of-a-kind flavors. Several brewers have expanded with comfy taprooms and eateries where you can sample products by the glass or by the flight. Here is where hops, malt, barley, and yeast are blended with pure Appalachian ingenuity. It's time to plan your beer-drinking journey through Mountaineer Country.

APOTHECARY ALE HOUSE AND CAFÉ

On the corner of Spruce and Pleasant Streets in downtown Morgantown, you will find the Apothecary Ale House and Café. Surrounded by outdoor lighting and a privacy fence, this spot offers the perfect space to hang out, relax, and enjoy the city sounds with a cold beer in hand. Browse a wide selection of beers, kick back with some friends, or compete in a friendly game of Bocce Ball. This is the place to be on the weekends.





CHESTNUT BREW WORKS

This is where the inventive beers are on tap. Recipes are often inspired by places in Mountaineer Country: the Halleck Pale Ale is a solid choice for a first pour in the taproom that is open Wednesday through Saturday in South Park.

MORGANTOWN BREWING COMPANY

The oldest operating brewery in the Mountain State is in the middle of Morgantown, and it's where the most interesting ales have been brewed for more than 20 years. At any time, guests are treated to 15 different beers on rotating taps. The gastropub menu is only surpassed by a glass of the crowd-favorite Alpha Blonde; the sour-ale slushie is the best bet for dessert.

MOUNTAIN STATE BREWING COMPANY

Claiming the distinction of the oldest distributing brewery in the state, this local favorite has several locations pouring cold pints and serving piping-hot flatbreads. The Cold Trail Ale, the Almost Heaven Amber Ale, and the Miner's Daughter Oatmeal Stout are always on tap and brewed by Mountain State.



HIGH GROUND BREWING

If you're an IPA fan, you won't be disappointed by the beer lineup that includes sours, stouts, and pale ales. The Terra Alta tap room offers growler fills and four-packs to go. High Ground Brewing is veteranowned and family operated.

SCREECH OWL BREWING

A visit to Screech Owl Brewing is an authentic mountain experience. And the beer, brewed in the "old farm style" fashion—no pasteurization, in small batches, and with top secret recipes—is memorable. Definitely try the seasonal beers on tap.



WINERIES

The Mountain State has an outstanding collection of vineyards and wineries within its borders. The West Virginia Division of Tourism has created a wine road map with planning tools for visiting all the vineyards and wineries. The Mountaineer Country portion promises to delight your palate with reds, whites, and blushes, plus fruit and dessert wines.

FORKS OF CHEAT WINERY

A family-owned vineyard in the heart of Mountaineer Country, Forks of Cheat produces more than more than 20,000 gallons of prize-winning wine each year. Stop by for a glass of Bad Cat Catawba or Redbud, best enjoyed on the outdoor deck overlooking the vineyard.

MOUNTAIN DRAGON MAZERY

Mountain Dragon Mazery in Fairmont produces the finest honey wine harvested from its own apiary on the Monongahela River. Mazery's products are sold at regional specialty stores, and tastings are held Thursday and Friday evenings or by appointment.

MONVALLEY VINEYARDS

The talented winemakers at MonValley Vineyards are available Tuesdays through Saturdays each week, so you can browse the winery's products, visit its wine cellar, and learn more about how the owner, Stephen Perrotti, turned a hobby into a full-time business.

AQUATIC CENTER AT MYLAN PARK

Get wet at the Aquatic Center at Mylan Park. The 90,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility was completed in 2019 and offers families the Huntington Community Pool for recreational swimming, a 50-meter Olympic-sized lap pool and diving well, and an outdoor splash pad.

HOVATTER'S WILDLIFE ZOO

This fun family spot is also known as the West Virginia Zoo. It is home to a menagerie of animals, including monkeys, giraffes, black bears, cougars, tigers, and chimpanzees. The zoo is a Kingwood institution and is open seasonally—from April to October, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.







TYGART ADVENTURE LAKE

Kids think it's cool to cool off at Tygart Lake State Park near Grafton. The 25 giant inflatables are securely anchored in the water, and a sandy beach with picnic tables and lounge chairs is close enough to watch the kids at play. Half-day and full-day sessions are available, and all participants must wear a life jacket while in the water.

TYGART LAKE CRUISES

Tygart Lake is stunning, and there's no better way to see her beauty than on a Tygart Lake Cruise. The kids will love the giant boat, and you'll appreciate the scenery and leisurely historical tour. Try the Pirate Tour for a little extra excitement.

PADLZ CANOE AND KAYAK RENTAL

Hit Bruceton Mills Lake in a kayak or canoe from Padlz Canoe and Kayak Rental in Preston County. The outing is perfect for all ages and all skill levels and is a great way to spend a hot day in Mountaineer Country. Reservations are required.

MON RIVER RAIL-TRAIL

The Mon River Rail-Trail is another excellent spot to explore. The repurposed former rail bed now serves as a scenic route for walking, running, or biking along the river and stretches for more than 47 miles.

BLACK BEARS GAME

The WV Black Bears is a collegiate summer baseball team and part of the Major League Baseball Draft League. Tickets to the games are affordable, and the whole crew will enjoy their day at the beautiful ballpark in Morgantown.

WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY (WVU)

WVU has been the center of the universe in Mountaineer Country since the state legislature established it in 1868. The naming of the state's only land-grant university combined three Morgantown schools—the Monongalia Academy, established in 1814; the Morgantown Female Academy, established in 1831; and the Woodburn Female Seminary, established in 1858.

Higher education runs deep in the community's roots, which means there's always something going on. From Big 12 athletic matches to engaging museums, learning opportunities and lectures, and theater performances, your itinerary will be full, fast!

BIG 12 ATHLETICS

West Virginia is part of the Big 12 Athletic Conference and offers 18 varsity sports that compete within the conference. With so many teams playing so many sports, you'll have your pick of events to attend. See the athletic schedules and buy tickets at wvusports.com.

PERSONAL RAPID TRANSIT SYSTEM (PRT)

Originally a demonstration project and the first large-scale automated guideway transit system in the US, WVU's PRT is an automated people mover that connects the three WVU campuses in Morgantown and the Morgantown central business district. Sixty-nine electric cars, all painted gold and blue, have moved more than 83 million people since opening to students and faculty in 1975.

HISTORICAL BUILDINGS

The historic nature of many college towns means they are full of unique architecture and peaceful beauty that is timeless, and WVU does not disappoint. Woodburn Circle is part of the downtown campus of West Virginia University and is a distinctive architectural assembly of three collegiate buildings, which evolved in the late nineteenth century. In chronological order, these are Martin Hall, Woodburn Hall, and Chitwood Hall. However, the largest of the buildings, Woodburn Hall, is best known as a symbol of the University.





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
